INTRODUCTION

About us

EveryChild is an international development charity, based in London, which militates for the protection of children's rights in 15 countries across the world. In the Republic of Moldova, EveryChild has been working since 1995. Collaborating with Chisinau, Cahul, Ungheni, Orhei, and Tiraspol local public authorities, EveryChild develops programs focused on prevention of child separation and institutional-

ization, social rehabilitation and family reintegration of institutionalized children. At the same time, nationally, in collaboration with the Government of the Republic of Moldova, EveryChild is implementing a technical assistance program in the reform of social policies for the protection of the child and the family. The goal of the programs implemented by EveryChild is to reduce the number of children in residen-

tial institutions in Moldova. By the year 2011, EveryChild will ensure the opportunity to grow up in secure and protected family environment to at least 4000 children separated of at risk of being separated from their families.

The republican center for the placement of minors was restructured and officially opened after refurbishment.

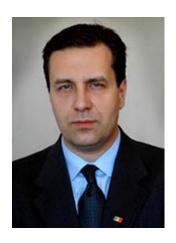

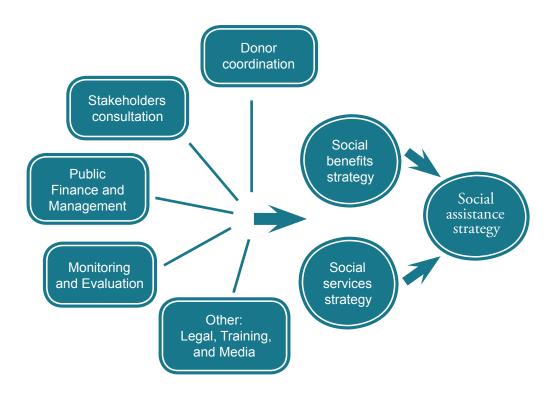

The reorganisation of the Cahul residential school

Funded by Andreas A David Foundation (2007 – 2010)

Goal

To reorganise Cahul residential school into a complex of community based social services for children, permanently or temporarily deprived of parental care, by the end of 2010.

Objectives

- 1. To support Cahul authorities in developing community based social services for temporary placement of children deprived of parental care, by 2010;
- 2. To support social integration of children into the mainstream school, to reintegrate the children with their biological families, or to place them in alternative family environments, by the end of 2010;
- 3. To consolidate community support to children and families, thus preventing child institutionalization, by the end of 2010.

Beneficiaries

- children at risk of being placed in the residential institution;

Mihai likes dancing and poetry. He is an artistical creature, and his aptitudes need developing, which is quite challenging in an internat.

As his father left him shortly after his birth, Mihai's mother was forced to maintain her child by herself. Thus, she decided to go to work in Italy to find a better employment. The first year far away from her home was like a dream – she found a job and she could support her child. After a year she came back home, but she had to return to Italy soon. Mihai's mother never returned after her second departure.

The grandparents are the only family Mihai has. When time for school came, his grandparents decided that a better opportunity for him to study would be the Cahul Gymnasium-internat. At first, Mihai accepted the idea, but as he was growing up, he understood that the best place is home, although he doesn't have a traditional family – it is called extended family in professional language, which means he lives with his grandparents.

Now Mihai Caragea is a 6th form pupil of the Cahul theoretical gymnasium. Even if he is not the best pupil, he leaves everybody behind in artistic activity. He makes friends easily, which was among the reasons why his internat teachers placed him at the top of the list of pupils to be reintegrated, being sure that the boy would easily adapt to a new environment. Mihai is not only very sociable, he is also highly compassionate. He never opposed his grandparents' decision to be placed in the internat. He could have been found in the internat even now, hadn't it been for the intervention of the Cahul Social Assistance Service, which had performed the assessment of the children, placed in residential institutions, and found a successful solution for the boy's case.

Mihai's rescue from residential care was possible only due to the intervention of social assistants. The social assistant helps the family assess the difficulties it faces, draw a complex picture of the situation and, at the same time, evaluate their own potential and determine what help they might need from the Social Assistance Department. The social assistant has a rather consultative role, offering family counseling and legal advice. (S)he is like a mediator between the families and other agencies — eitherstate or private — involved in solving beneficiaries' problems.

Mihai likes dancing and poetry. He is an artistical creature, and his aptitudes need developing,

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... Now Alexandru and Maria are at home. Now they are a family. They probably feel a bit more difficult, but they are learning to overcome difficulties and to be what they always wanted to be. Alexandru is now in the 6th form, and he has been attending gymnasium in the village of Boligan, the Orhei rayon, for the last 2 years. His sister Maria, who is 2 years younger than him, goes to the same school. They are very different – Alexandru is always in the centre of everyone's attention, being a very energetic boy and always itching to play a trick to somebody, whereas Maria is quite balanced and diligent. Their colleagues and teachers never had anything to reproach to the two children, even though they had previously been placed in the internat.

Three years ago, their family had a crisis situation – as a result of an incident at work, the children's father lost his employment. As the family had no other steady source of income, the parents made, probably, the most difficult decision in their lives – to take their children away and place them in the Orhei gymnasium – internat. At the time, in their opinion, it was the best way out and the only chance to offer their children the best they could – good education... Later, the parents were to regret that decision. Maria and Alexandru asked to be brought back home, regardless of the difficulties they had to face in the family. No, they did not complain about their life in the internat. The most disconcerting was the lack

of love that only their family could give them. The family gave them forces and they integrated with the new team from the local community school easily.

Now Maria and Alexandru carry out their home and school duties. Alexandru substitutes the parents, while Maria

is a nanny to the smaller children.

The girl is also responsible to her classmates, who voted her as the monitor.

Maria and Alexandru Placinta's reintegration with their family was possible due to the efforts, made by the staff of the Social Assistance Department, who convinced the parents that, being together, the children would feel much better. At the same time, the Department offered half-a-year financial support to the family.

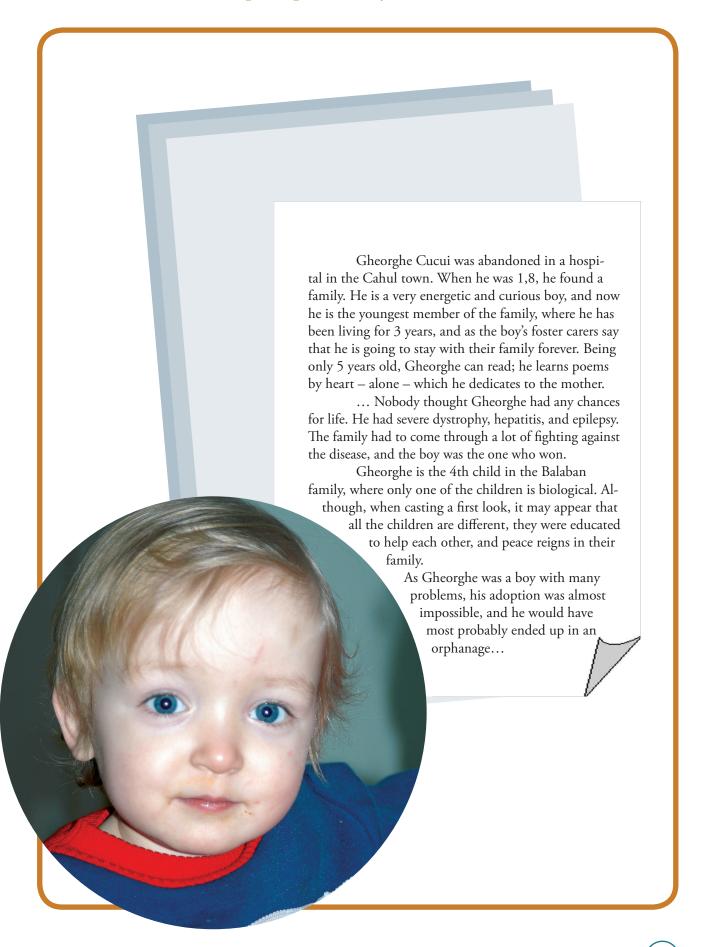

Achievements:

At the end of the year 2006,

Soroca rayon council approved the

Regulations of Foster Care, Family Support and Reintegration, Gatekeeping system. Since January 2007, the Directorate for Social Assistance and Family Protection employed 6 social assistants, who, together with the personnel of the Directorate, were trained in delivering the services mentioned above. 17 children were reinte-

grated in their biological families. 90 families with 229 children received family

support during the year 2007. As a result of advertising campaign, run for the recruitment of foster carers, in present there are 27 foster care applicants, who are in present being assessed and trained.

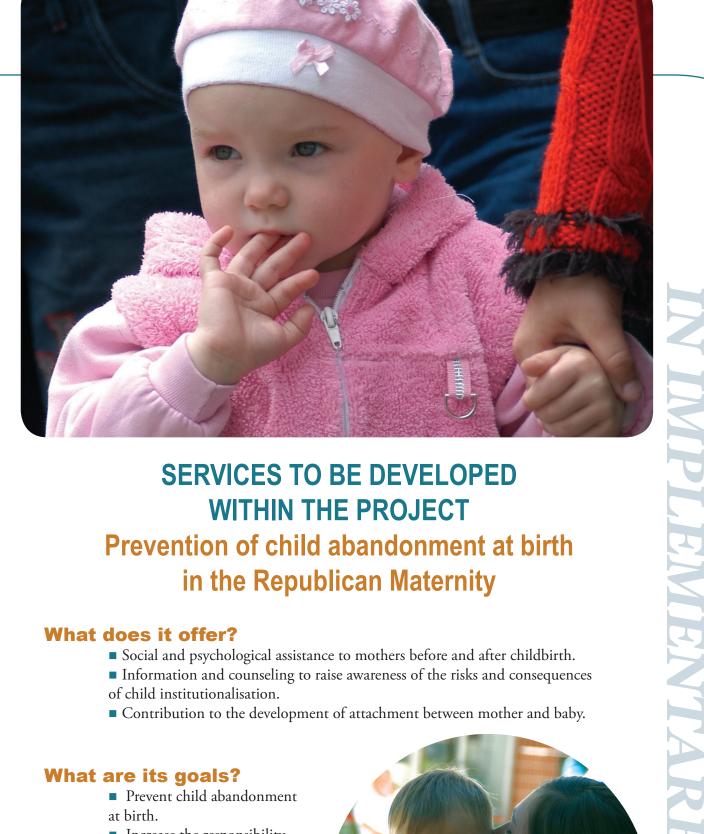

Achievements:

As a result of the activities performed within the project, a multidisciplinary team (consisting of a social assistant, psychologist, and medical staff) was set up, trained, and consolidated within the Republican Maternity. Up to the present, due to this team's intervention, of 62 risk-of - abandonment cases, registered at the Republican Maternity, 49 cases of child's separation from the mother were avoided, with the children remaining in the family. At the same time, the premises of the social accommodation unit for parent-and-baby couples were renovated. This unit is going to be opened officially by the end of 2007.

Goal

Reduce the number of newborn babies, abandoned in the Ungheni Rayon, by the end of 2008.

Objectives

- 1. Develop a child abandonment at birth prevention service in the Maternity and Children's Hospital in Ungheni, by the end of 2008;
- 2. Develop and test the service of placement of mothers with newborn babies in foster care, by the end of 2008;
- 3. Set up a sustainable community-based residential service, to support mothers with babies during the after-birth period, by the end of 2008;
- 4. Prevent abandonment and build on community support for future and new parents, by the end of 2008.





- Capacities of medical staff and other specialists in the Maternity and Children's Hospital in Ungheni built;
- Rayon-level referral mechanism for abandonment cases set up;

Achievements

The project was launched in August 2006. According to the decision of the Ungheni Rayon Council, the placement center for parent-and-baby couples was created within the Department of Social Assistance and Family Protection, and is a unit of regional interest. The Ungheni Rayon Council took over the running costs of this residential service. The unit was officially opened in August 2007. It is worth mentioning that a qualitative study was performed within the project, in order to identify the causes of child abandonment at birthand what interventions the community and the local and central public authorities should make.

"...Child abandonment at birthis determined by a combination of a number of causes: economic, financial (lack of living space and of financial resources), psychological (lack of responsibility and of parental feelings), relational (no support from the parents andthe family), and educational (lack of sexual education). These causes, in different combinations, are true for different categories of women, abandoning their newborn babies.

Community's opinion (fist of all, the opinion of the state), is very significant, and may influence parents' decision regarding the abandonment of their child. This is why women, intending to abandon their newborn baby, choose to deliver in Chisinau. It allows

them to keep their pregnancy and childbirth in secret, as well as to avoid remorse caused by accusations made by their relatives, with regard to keeping the child. Thus, determined in many instances by socio-economical conditions, and being rejected by their extended families, women decide to give in to critical circumstances, evading and avoiding assuming responsibility of upbringing their children. It has been revealed that, in some cases, women decided to abandon their child at the suggestion of medical staff, especially of the family doctor – the first contact person for a pregnant woman.

Lack of coordination and of integrity of health and social services at community level favours child abandonment at birth, in the conditions, when a woman at risk does not always receive support and help she needs to overcome difficult situations..."

Prevention of child separation from family, by providing a complex of social services in Tiraspol.

Objectives

- 1. Set up Tiraspol family counseling center and integrate it in the local services system, by the end of 2009;
- 2. Set up a set of high-quality services and provide them to children and families in difficulty, by the end of 2009.

Beneficiaries

- children at risk of abandonment / separation from parents;
- children-victims of abuse and violence;
- families in difficulty.

Expected outcomes:

- Family Counseling Center set up by the end of 2005, and fully operational, providing counseling services, by the end of 2006;
- Family Counseling Center integrated in the system of services in the field of childcare, by the end of 2009;
- A team of specialists offer quality services, among which social support and psychological, psychotherapeutic, and legal counseling to children and families in difficulty;
- Efficient mechanisms of collaboration with other agencies established by the end of 2007;
- Mechanism of monitoring and evaluation of delivered services developed and fully operational by the end of 2006.



Achievements

The Family Counseling Center was officially launched at the end of 2005, and it currently delivers family support services and psychological, psychotherapeutic, and legal counseling services. 700 children and 300 parents were offered services within the center. An efficient referral mechanism for risk-of-abandonment, institutionalization, and abuse cases was set up within the center, in collaboration with the local administration and NGOs.

Capacity building in the field of street children's rights' protection

Funded by Communication Workers Union and SIF Moldova (2001 – 2005)

Goal

Improve the life chances for street children, by providing them with care in a secure and protective family environment.

Objectives

- Reorganize the Center for temporary placement of children in a child-friendly service, focused on social assistance, by the end of 2005;
- The institutions in charge with children's rights' protection collaborate efficiently and show commitment to meet street children's needs and protect their rights.

Expected outcomes:

- The premises of the Center renovated (to create a more friendly environment for the children).
- New regulations, stipulating the reorganization of services and focusing them on the child and social assistance, applied.
- Team of social assistants set up and integrated in the structure of the centre, and their professional skills developed.
- Mechanism for multi-disciplinary collaboration set up within the Centre and operational.
- A mechanism for inter-department collaboration is established.
- Public awareness campaigns designed and launched by the staff of the Centre.

Beneficiaries

- Street children and their families.

Achievements

The Reception Centre for Minors was transformed both legally and physically, into the Centre for Temporary Placement of Street Children (minors). The findings of the final assessment are shown below. This final assessment was carried out by "Axa Management Consulting" Company, at the request of EveryChild.

"On completing the qualitative study, we can state that the first objective of the Project was fully achieved by obtaining both the planned and the unplanned outputs, such as the change in the attitude of the staff, children and families regarding the need to reorganise the service, in order to create a positive perception of the Centre.

As to Objective 2, findings can be formulated by analysing the current statistical data, especially the ones presented in annual reports made by the Center to the Ministry of the Interiour."

On the basis of these data, we can formulate the following findings:

There is a general tendency for aggravation of the situation around street children, and this fact is determined not by the negative influence of the Project, but rather by external factors that cannot be influenced by the Project (such as the socio-economic situation in Moldova, increase of emigration, and, consequently, of the numbers of children deprived of parental care, etc.).

The growth dynamics is noticed only in the case of children, coming from the institutions of the educational system, whereas one of the reasons leading to an aggravation of the phenomenon of street children resides in the activity of these institutions. Moreover, the most severe situation is noticed in internat schools, where the comparative growth of the numbers of children placed in the Center between 2001 (when the Project started its activity) and 2005 (the last year of Project activity) constitutes 179 %.

This finding is supported by reverse dynamics, in significant decrease, which refers to the numbers of minors, who neither work nor study. The table below demonstrates that this category faced a significant decrease:

The significant decrease in the numbers of minors, belonging to the category of those who neither study nor work and placed in the Centre between 2003 and 2005, leads to the conclusion that the positive impact of the Centre over this category of minors is not so susceptible to other institutions' influence.

Thus, we can state that, in case of minimum influence of other external factors, uncontrolled by the general intervention of the Project, the positive impact of the changes made to the work routine of the Centre, implemented through the Project, has played an important part in the improvement of the situation around street children.

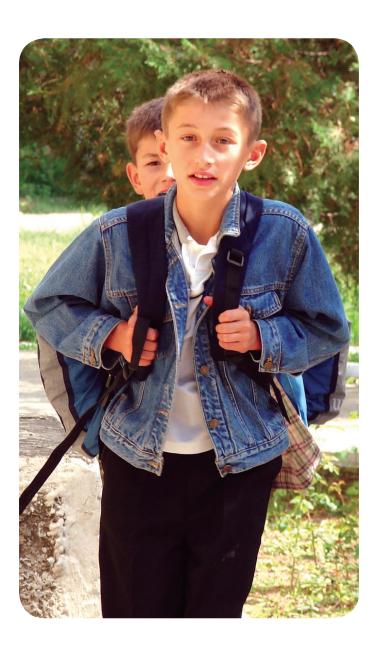

Final Conclusions

Through this Project, sufficient sustainable conditions were created for the work of the service for street children, which provides day care, education, and medical and social rehabilitation. Thus, it has become possible to maintain the high quality of the services, provided within the Centre, and reduce the numbers of street children, in case if the external conditions, uncontrolled by the Project, become more favourable.

These statements, however, are subject to risks, relating to:

- The reduction of opportunities for development of the staff of the Centre after Project closure:
- staff turnover, especially within the team of social assistants;
- insufficient opportunities for dissemination of best practice, accumulated by similar institutions from other localities.



It is also worth mentioning that the Centre is subordinated to the Ministry of the Interiour. During the assessment period, it was discovered that, in some instances, the Ministry's policy with regard to street children is in discrepancy with the principles of child protection, while the collection of statistical information is the key activity in working with street children or young offenders. This is why, the Centre for temporary placement of children, being a social institution, should be transferred under the jurisdiction of the branch ministry – the one of Social Protection, Family and Child".

Resource Centre within the Chisinau Municipal Directorate for Children's Rights' Protection

(2002-2004)

Goal

To setup, by the end of 2004, a sustainable structure for training and resources for professionals and decision makers in the field of child protection within the Municipal Directorate for Children's Rights' Protection (MDCRP).

Objectives

- To support the MDCRP in the setup of the Resource and Training Centre;
- To offer continuous training opportunities for practitioners and decision makers, by creating a local team of trainers and developing the training modules;
- ■To build capacities of the Centre's team in researching, monitoring and evaluation of services for children and families, and in the dissemination of best practice.

Beneficiaries

- professionals and decision makers, working in the field of child protection, other specialists working in relevant areas, such as police, medicine, education, as well as interested persons from all areas of the country, as direct beneficiaries;
- families and children of social services beneficiaries, as indirect beneficiaries.



Expected outcomes

- Resource and Training Center launched and fully operational.
- Training practices and opportunities piloted by different donors and reviewed.
- Methodological training basis developed.
- Database of local trainers developed.
- Database of training needs developed.
- Training program/modules developed.
- Annual development plans of the team in place.
- Monitoring and evaluation services developed.

Achievements

The Resource Centre was set up, taken over, and integrated in the structure of the MDCRP. Up to present, over 1000 specialists and professionals benefited from training and resources of the Centre.





Capacity Building in Social Policy Reform in Moldova

Funded by the European Commission within the TACIS Programme (2003 – 2006)

Goal

Build the capacity of the Government of Moldova to implement a coherent social policy reform in the childcare field and decrease reliance on institutional care.

Objectives

- Support the Ministry of Health and Social Protection with the Ministry of Education in developing working models of alternative childcare and decrease the reliance on institutional care;
- Support the Government to develop the competence of staff and their managers in best practice in the field of child protection and childcare;
- Increase public awareness of the effects of institutionalisation and the effective methods of working with children at risk in the community.

Achievements

- (1) Improvement of legal framework in child protection field, improvement of secondary legislation for services implementation, improvement of services delivery standards and quality;
- (2) Development of flexible financial mechanisms that would allow for the development of community-based services and delivery of targeted services, in the context of guarding the money-follows-the-child principle;
- (3) Development of a system of community-based social services for children and families in difficulty, focused on gate-keeping, social rehabilitation and reintegration of children with their families in pilot regions of Cahul, Orhei, Ungheni, and the dissemination of the project in 50% of regions from Moldova;
- (4) Development of the following documents: the Regulations with regard to the work of the Rayon Gate-keeping Commission (Commission for the Protection of the Child in Difficulty) as an independent and efficient system of prevention of institutionalisation, implemented in pilot regions; Foster Care Service Regulations; Family Support and Reintegration Service Regulations; and their approval by MSPFC and local councils;
- (5) Assessment of residential institutions in pilot regions; development and implementation of a sample strategy for the reorganisation of local child protection system;
- (6) Support and development of National Action Plans for residential care system reorganisation;
- (7) Development of policy for redirection of money from residential care to family-type care;
- (8) In-service training and retraining of 450 specialists within the system;
- (9) Setup of National Resource Centre for the dissemination of best practice and development of the team of national trainers in the field of social care;
- (10) Development of Strategy and Curriculum for national training and retraining of social care specialists, etc.



"...Obviously, the initial terms of reference for this project were too ambitious in the political circumstances at the moment when the project was launched. Due to a lack of Government's engagement in reforming the child protection system, two years had to pass before the President's office became involved. If the project had not been extended for another year, this objective would not have been fulfilled. Taking this into consideration, it would probably have been better if / when the agreement for the project was signed with the EU, the Government had been fully aware of the engagement and the role it had assumed."

The main verifiable factor of the project was decreased number of children in internats in the three pilot rayons.

"I would like to say that the project had noble objectives. Unfortunately, the residential system of childcare used to be a significant part of the educational system during the Soviet times, and, at that moment, there was no alternative for parents in difficulty – they actually were pushed to place their children in residential care. We also used to believe that this was the best method to help children in difficulty. However, with the help of this project, we became aware of alternative ways. We also managed to raise public awareness. Thus, families' situation started to be assessed, and family support and reintegration services started to work.

Last year, about 50 children were reintegrated with their biological families: we all now admit that children should be cared for and brought up in families, and that internats are not the best option for them. Certainly, we cannot simply close the internats down. First, we should develop alternative ways, and then transform the internats into community schools. At present, the conditions are better, the social assistants perform the professional assessment of families and children, and the mentality of institutions' staff and of the civil society is changing."

"Moreover, it is beyond any discussion that the decrease in the number of placements would have been even greater, if internats had not recruited children from other rayons as well – another argument in favour of the efficiency of Rayon Commissions for the protection of the rights of children in difficulty...Very efficient teams of social assistants were created. These teams, supported by newly created Gate-keeping Commissions, had a significant impact on the rate of children's entries in internat schools in the three pilot rayons. Social assistants were employed and trained in all three pilot rayons. Then mechanisms for the development and delivery of family support and reintegration, foster care services and gate-keeping system were created, according to a standard model used by EveryChild in countries from the region.

Very effective work was done within the financial component, especially on calculating relative costs of residential and family-based care. A big number

of training was done, efficient professional standards were developed, very extensive work was done to adjust the legislation in the area. Also, extremely efficient was the work performed within the public relations component – a significant result was the speech of President Vladimir Voronin

in May 2006."

The Project's activities were supported by the social campaign "Call Your Future Back Home". Its goal was to raise public awareness of the need to bring the child up in the family, as well as of the negative effects of institutionalisation.

Trough media products, community-based social services for children and families were promoted, while both the government officials and communities were encouraged to apply residential care for children only as the last resort.

THE MAIN ACTIONS OF THE MEDIA CAMPAIGN

"Call The Future Home"

- 20 journalists from the central and local mass media were trained within the study visit to Great Britain;
- Project partners were trained on efficient communication with the mass media and on advocacy;
- Two opinion polls were performed by IMAS at the beginning and at the end of the campaign;
- Social theatre "Apple Tree Blossoms" was organised (idea, promotion, broadcast, put on stage and on TV);







- 2 national and 1 international conference were organised;
- 5 video and 3 audio tracks were launched;
- Radio and TV debates' programs were organised;
- Materials were published in the press;
- Radio and TV marathon was organised at the public company "Teleradio-Moldova";
- 1 topical documentary and 4 films about alternative social services were broadcast;
- 29 specialised newsletters, 3 bilingual magazines (Romanian and English) were printed;
- Advertising materials, billboards, and stickers were printed and cast, etc.

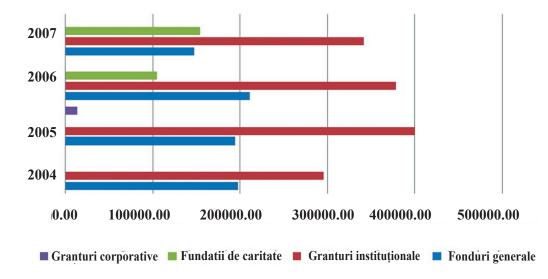
